

How does it work?

Numerology uses numbers to explain a person's character and offer advice for the future. It dates back to the early Greek mathematician Pythagoras, though modern scientists generally view it as a pseudoscience.

Similar to the way astrology looks to astronomy and the movements of planets to explain traits and tendencies, numerology looks to the numbers to identify characteristics and divine the future.

In "Glynis Has Your Number" (Hyperion, \$19.95), numerologist Glynis McCants breaks down birthdates and names into six single-digit numbers: the Life Path, Soul, Personality, Power Name, Birth Day and Attitude num-

To calculate your Life Path number, add every number in your birthdate and keep reducing it until you're left with a single digit.

For instance, Tom Cruise was born on July 3, 1962, or 7/3/1962. Add those numbers individually -7+3+1+9+6+2 - and you get 10. Add 1+0 and you get 1, the Life Path number for Cruise.

McCants describes the different characteristics of the different numbers in detail in the book, but in general, they might summarized as follows:

1: Independent, self-motivated, hard workers who want to be No. 1. They're hard on themselves, and can be critical of others. They like to be When celebrities want to know what's coming, they rely on ...

McCants looks almost heartsick as she talks about Brad and Jen and the split that rocked, if not the world, at least that part that gets its gossip in the grocery
